Safer Streets Fund provides additional reassurance for women and girls



Following a successful partnership bid of £733,551 last summer, Havant Borough Council - along with four other Solent local authorities - has invested in a number of projects help tackle anti-social behaviour and violence against women and girls. Funding comes via the Safer Streets Fund - a government initiative designed to reduce crime across England and Wales by providing Police and Crime Commissioners with funding to implement situational crime prevention measures.

Work is on-going throughout the summer, but highlights in the borough include our Community Safety Partners Motiv8 delivering dedicated youth support work to challenge anti-social behaviour, offer support, and provide outreach activities.

Partnership work with other authorities includes:

- 436 participants receiving Community in Motion – 'Positive Bystander' training, providing those working in the Night Time Economy key skills regarding awareness and reduction of Violence Against Women and Girls, and also how to be a positive bystander within the community.
- 11 schools signed up to the 'Mentoring in Violence Production', giving young people the chance to explore and challenge the attitudes and beliefs that underpin genderbased violence in society..
- Survey work underway for the 'With You' project working directly with women in the sex industry to ensure that they are supported.

It's play time!

Recognising the importance of play for children - both in terms of physical and mental health - Havant Borough Council has invested in a programme of works rolling out to rejuvenate and improve play areas across the borough.

Working in close partnership with local resident groups and securing funding from a number of sources, play areas have been targetted for refubishment. Furthermore, local residents have informed the nature of the refurbishments, engaging with the council online to provide their thoughts, perspectives and aspirations.

In the last two years, extensive refurbishment has taken place in Emsworth Park and Jubilee Park, Waterlooville. Public consultation has also recently closed on refurbishments in:



- Bidbury Mead, Bedhampton
- Front Lawn, Leigh Park
- Springwood, Waterlooville
- Spencers Field, Emsworth
- Eastoke Corner, Hayling Island

The views of residents have been critical in informing how children will use and enjoy the revitalised play areas; for example the refit of Bidbury Mead and Front Lawn play areas will now consider accessible play equipment and additional picnic tables and bins in their refit as led by popular demand.

Havant Park gains a poignant sculpture

Strong winds from Storm Eunice in
February 2022 led to a mature London
Plane tree falling in the corner of Havant
Park - thankfully without harming anyone.
Originally planted on the corner of Elm Road
and Park Road North around 1910 by the
Headmaster of Havant Council School (now
Fairfields Infant School) with the help of his
pupils, efforts were made to ensure this once
impressive tree would not be forgotten.

In partnership working, Hampshire County Council and Havant Borough Council organised for a substantive part of the tree to be kept in Havant Park. Removing the limbs and roots of the tree, it was moved close to its original site and the children's playground.

Decided the best use of the tree would be as a bench sculpture to both commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and her passing in September 2022, children from Bosmere Junior School were invited to draw what they would like to see carved into the trunk.

Acclaimed chainsaw sculptor Christopher Bain was commissioned to undertake this important, emotive project. Working with the shape of the tree, Christopher was able to incorporate a number of elements into his work, including:

- The Queen's insignia, and the date of her reign.
- A corgi the monarch's favourite dog.
- A swan famously, all swans in England and Wales are owned by the reigning monarch.

What is a London Plane?

The London Plane tree was created by chance by famous English botanist John Tradescant the Younger in the 17th century, when two trees in his collection - an Oriental Plane and the American Sycamore - cross-pollinated. Occurring in his London nursery, the tree became popular in London from the late 18th century, and is now seen throughout the capital, along streets and in parks.

Support for Ukraine

Brent House provides welcome temporary housing provision

Safe, secure, temporary housing can provide a real lifeline to individuals, familes and the vulnerable, so it was with a considerable sense of achievement that the newly refurbished Brent House opened in Leigh Park this spring.

Comprehensively redeveloped over a five year period by the charity Two Saints, the property now provides 29 much-needed temporary homes with support, for single people and families. In partnership with the housing association VIVID, Havant Borough Council, Lloyds Bank

and many other contractors eager to support the venture the facility is now a critical asset for the borough and an excellent base from which to find permanent housing. Dedicated staff from Two Saints also provide vital support helping clients with the practicalities of securing permanent homes.

At the launch event for Brent House, Councillor Gwen Robinson said "I'm delighted to be a part of the official opening of Brent House. Working in partnership, Two Saints and Havant Borough Council will strive to support those residents who have found themselves experiencing challenging and difficult times. This invaluable asset will provide security and a safe space for those in need, whilst working in tandem with the council in securing permanent homes for its residents. Brent House is an inspirational resource which will provide lifechanging opportunities to our residents, and I welcome the many benefits it will provide.".

Watching out in Waterlooville...

Working closely with local businesses in Waterlooville town centre, Havant Borough Council is installing four re-deployable CCTV cameras to help address anti-social behaviour and vandalism in the town. £25,000 of funding from the United Kingdom Shared Prosperity Fund was secured to fund the project.

Engagement with local residents highlighted anti-social behaviour in the town centre was one of their key concerns. Additionally, local businesses had highlighted crimes such as shoplifting and vandalism were not being consistently reported.



Hampshire and Isle of Wight Constabulary have previously faced difficulties due to the lack of direct evidence of those responsible; the CCTV coverage will both provide valuable evidence for the police and also act as a deterrent.

The CCTV is just one part of a suite of activities undertaken in the town centre - other recent actions include youth outreach to over 200 young people provided by the charity Y Services, the successful use of drone cameras to capture trespassing on rooftops by the police, and collaborative work by the Business Crime Reduction Partnership.

New chief executive for a re-invigorated council

Following a vigorous recruiting process,
Havant Borough Council has a new chief
executive - Steve Jorden. With a successful
track record in managing customer-facing
services, organisational change and delivering
substantial regeneration and development
projects, Steve's considerable expertise will be
put to good use in the borough.

Prior to taking up the role at Havant Borough Council, Steve worked with many other local authorities including district councils in Devon and Worcestershire. More recently Steve worked with Oxfordshire County Council and Cherwell District Council, where he oversaw their decoupling as a partnership.

supported by an almost entirely new Executive Leadership Team, who will provide the drive, skills and experience to deliver on the council's refreshed corporate strategy and its three over-arching goals of Wellbeing, Pride in Place and Growth.

Exciting regeneration project underway in Havant town centre



Concept art for the redeveloped Bulbeck Road site highlights its possible use for town centre living.

Work has begun as part of Havant Borough Council's ambitious plans to regenerate the heart of Havant town centre. A key site at the heart of the town centre is to be redeveloped to help kick-start Havant's considerable potential.

The Bulbeck Road car park is an under-used resource owned by the council that doesn't make best use of its town centre location. £1.65 million of grant funding was secured from the Department for Levelling Up & Communities and its Brownfield Land Release Fund 2 in November 2022. The funding which will be used to demolish the existing car park and create a site for the future development of new housing in the heart of the town centre.

Although yet to be finalised, previous research has highlighted the practical use of the site for housing. Indicative modelling suggesting the site is capable of providing 91 high-quality town centre flats, sensitively landscaped into their



surroundings with public realm improvements and built to the latest environmental standards.

An experienced local company - Hughes & Salvidge of Portsmouth - have been secured for the demolitions work. Once preliminary surveys of the site are complete, an extensive recycling regime will be followed with the demolition of the car park. Elements include recycling 100% of recovered metal and the segregation of plastics, polystyrene, glass, fibreglass and plasterboard for recycling where appropriate. Concrete, bricks and masonry will be taken from the site to be crushed, with the car park's concrete base compacted in situ to backfill on site. Surplus material will be taken for re-use elsewhere.

This project is just one part of an ambitious regeneration vision - not just for Havant, but the borough as a whole. For more information, visit www.havant.gov.uk/regeneration.

Investment in cycling and walking connects Havant better

Having secured funding from the government's Transforming Cities Fund and up to £500,000 of Community Infrastructure Levy support from Havant Borough Council, Hampshire County Council have begun work on improving connectivity between Havant town centre, Havant and South Downs College (HSDC) and the north of the town.

The improvements will provide safe, convenient and direct off-carriageway travel for cyclists and improved facilities for pedestrians, including such features as:

- Two-way segregated travel, providing wider footways for pedestrians with a separate cycle track.
- Upgraded pedestrian crossings, and pedestrian/cyclist priority on select roads.
- Narrowing of Elmleigh Road to slow traffic and discourage HGV traffic.



Ecological and environmental considerations have been at the forefront of the project; the works will replace any trees and hedges felled as part of the project and recommends planting of bulbs, wildflowers and mixed grasses to improve ecological diversity.

Dedicated experts to help Hayling and Waterlooville regeneration plans

Havant Borough Council have now employed two regeneration officers to tackle issues in Waterlooville town centre and Hayling Island. The officers are going to support regeneration through short term and long term interventions. This includes looking at enhancing the appearance of these areas and looking at parking regimes. The council are also looking at longer term plans for strategic development as well as other measures.

The new Hayling Island officer will work with a variety of businesses and organisations in partnership to secure local improvements. The council have secured funding from the UK Skills Fund that will help deliver disabled access to the seafront, and Changing Places funding to make seafront public conveniences accessible to the disabled. The council are also looking at ways it can improve play areas near the beach. They will also look at other areas of development along the seafront and will engage with local residents shortly to discuss some of these plans.

The council are working with businesses and landowners in Waterlooville to get views on how we can improve the appearance of the town centre and return it to a place residents can be proud of. The council are also carrying out a formal master planning exercise to guide the regeneration of the town centre. Residents, businesses and other stakeholders will be invited to give their views on what they'd like to see in the town, with details on how to get involved released soon.

New Mayor of Havant takes up her role

The position of Mayor is one of the most ancient offices in British history, but its role, importance and public perception have changed considerably through the centuries.

Councils can have a civic Mayor, Lord Mayor or Chairman depending on the status of the area. The borough is entitled to have a mayor, after receiving its borough status in 1974.

In May each year a new Mayor for the Borough of Havant is elected. The Mayor is selected from one of the borough's 38 Councillors and is officially voted in at a special meeting of Havant Borough Council at a ceremony called Mayor Making.



As well as representing the borough as its first citizen at local, civic and charitable events, the Mayor chairs council meetings and is politically impartial during their year in office.

This year Councillor Rosy Raines returned to take up her role as The Worshipful the Mayor of Havant, with Councillor Peter Wade elected as Deputy Mayor. Rosy was previously the Mayor in 2021/22. You can follow the Mayor on Facebook at **facebook.com/MayorOfHavant**.

High Street Task Force offers future direction for Havant

Following a visit from the High Streets Task Force in March this year, a series of expert recommendations for the future of Havant town centre have been presented.

The High Streets Task Force is an alliance of place making experts working nationally to support the vitality of high streets, providing guidance, tools and skills to help communities, partnerships and local government take action to help their town centres thrive.

The task force visited initially to consider what was the main barrier to any future transformation of the town centre. They recognised the many strengths of Havant town centre which includes its strong cultural heritage, its enthusiastic communities, its strong independent shopping offer and its excellent connectivity.

The report's key recommendation was in highlighting the importance of multi-stakeholder engagement in delivering any town centre transformation and setting up a collaborative team to lead future action.
